The recent spike in temperature has made it almost impossible for most students to have a relaxing and enjoyable lunch; anyone who does not rush to a shady area and secure themselves a spot has the unfortu-

Beginning second semester of the 2016-2017 school year, PHS opened up the brand new lunch area by the 4000 building where students are made to stay during lunch. As a result of this opening, students are now prohibited to sit at any of the former lunch areas such as those by the S.T.E.M. building, the multiple sitting areas that extend from the Counseling Office all the way down to the Discipline Office, and the quad by the old Ceramics

FIDGET SPINNERS— The Hype... The Reality

A **fidget spinner** is a type of stress-relieving toy. A basic fidget spinner consists of a bearing in the center of a design made from any of a variety of materials including brass, stainless steel, titanium, copper and plastic. The toy has been advertised as helping people who have trouble with focusing or fidgeting (such as those with ADHD, autism, or anxiety) by acting as a release mechanism for nervous energy or psychological stress. Experts were divided on this claim, with some supporting it while others disputed its scientific basis and argued the toy may actually be more distracting. Although they were invented in the 1990s, fidget spinners became a popular toy in 2017. Often marketed with health benefits, the toy began being used by school children, resulting in some schools banning the spinners, arguing that the toy became a distraction in classrooms. Other schools are allowing the toy to be used discreetly by children in order to help them concentrate. On December 23, 2016, James Plafke of *Forbes* published an article describing fidget spinners as the "must-

have office toy for 2017."^[4] In late March, users on social media websites such as YouTube and Reddit began uploading videos reviewing and performing tricks with fidget spinners.^[6] *The Boston Globe* reported that fidget toys in general "entered the mainstream" with the related Fidget Cube toy also rising in popularity.^[1] Several sellers on Etsy were reported to be creating and selling customized spinner designs.^[1]

The fidget spinner's popularity began to increase greatly in April 2017, with Google searches for "fidget spinner" spiking that month, according to *Money* magazine.^[11]

^[12] By May 4, variations of the spinner occupied every spot on Amazon's top 20 best seller list for toys.^[11] Many publications referred to the fidget spinner as a fad, with some journalists comparing it to the rise in popularity of water bottle flipping in 2016.^{[13][14]} On April 27, 2017, the *New York Post* detailed, "so-called fidget spinners, low-tech, low-price stress relieving toys, are a huge fad sweeping the country, and stores can't keep them in stock."^[13] In May 2017, there was so much demand for fidget spinners that in China, some factories that used to make cellphones and phone accessories switched to making fidget spinners.^[15]

On May 16, 2017, video game publisher Ketchapp released a fidget spinner app. The app re-

ceived 7 million downloads in the first two weeks after it was released.^[16]

With the rapid increase in the spinner's popularity in 2017 — combined with the spinner's often advertised benefits for individuals with ADHD and autism, among other conditions — many children and teenagers began using it in school.^[17]

As a result of their frequent usage by school children, many school districts have banned the toy.^{[5][6][20]} Cited reasons for their banning were often teachers arguing that the spinners distracted students from completing their school work.^[11] Taylor-Klaus stated, "there are definitely times that kids don't know how to use a fidget and it becomes the primary focus instead of the background focus", adding that, "spinners are visually distracting, and they can make some noise, so it's not an ideal fidget for the classroom. But they're becoming a distraction for some kids. For students who don't have a disability, it's a toy, and that's never been allowed."^[17] According to a study from the fidget spinner database Spinner List, 32% of the top 200 American high schools — the 100 largest private and 100 largest public schools, according to Department of Education data — have banned spinners from the premises.^[21]

The night began with swimmer athletes arriving in the MPR with snacks to accompany the main course: Little Caesar's Pizza. Eventually, all swimmers, coaches, and family that would be attending the banquet arrived and everyone came together to eat chips, pizza, fried chicken, cookies, cupcakes, and drink either their choice of carbonated soda or the only healthy item on the menu, water. Soon after all in the room finished eating, the awards ceremony started.

The awards began with JV boys receiving their participation certificates from their coach, Joseph Valdez. The two JV players who received an award were Jonathan Menez, freshman, and Joshua Ramirez, freshman. Due to an alleged leg injury, Ramirez was not able to compete at most meets of the season. mers. Again, only one trophy was awarded. Allison Campos, JV Swim coach, awarded MVP to a very dedicated hard working freshman who throughout the season was always the first in the pool, pushed themselves the most, and never stopped trying to improve: Yesenia Contreras.

This 2017 swim season was especially unique for both the girls and boys varsity teams. Traditionally, each team has their own coach, but because last year's boys varsity coach resigned his position, the swim team faced the threat of not having Boys Varsity Swimming. Thankfully for them, Matt Schmidt, varsity swim coach and history teacher, stepped up to the plate and coached both boys and girls varsity swimming which means he presented both teams their varsity swimming certificates and trophies; each team received three trophies.

Schmidt started with his favorite team, Girls Varsity Swim. The first trophy awarded was the Girls Varsity Most Improved Award; this award went to the third highest point ranking female swimmer on the entire team, Karla Alvarez, freshman. Alvarez began the team with raw talent that throughout the season she refined and perfected; it was her hard work that secured her a spot as one of the fastest on the girls team early in the

season and led her to drop the most time overall, earning her the Varsity Most Improved Award. The next trophy recipient was Melinda Rose Medina, senior, receiving the Varsity Team Leadership Award. As the only senior on the entire swim team to have been varsity all four years of high school, Schmidt believed Medina deserved this award because not only did she have a great amount of experience and knowledge on all aspects of the sport, but she also held a very prominent position as the unpronounced captain. In the words of Coach Schmidt, "No matter what the topic may have been, any girl would come up to me to talk about something and say, 'Let me run it by Melinda.'"

Last but certainly not least, the Girls Varsity MVP Award was given to Katerina Thap, freshman. Going into league finals, Thap and Medina were tied for MVP but that quickly changed when Thap swam her main event, the 100 Backstroke. Going into league finals as 5th in the event, Thap swam her heart out and dropped her P.R. down to one minute and 10 seconds. This race did many things for the freshman: made her 3rd overall in the 100 backstroke, landed her in the top ten backstroke swimmers in Perris High Swim history, and most of all scored her enough points to pass Medina and be this year's Girls Varsity MVP. With only one female senior varsity trophy winner graduating and the other two being freshman, the future of the Schmidt's Varsity Girls Swim Team is

promising.

The last trophies of the night to be awarded were for three athletes on the boys varsity team. The first trophy was the boys Varsity Most Improved Award and that was received by Gabriel Valdez, junior. When describing why he believed Valdez was the most deserving for this award, Schmidt said, "This person is always first in the pool for practice and seventh period swim and is always looking for ways to improve." The second trophy was awarded to Hector Valdez, junior, and he received the Varsity Most Impressive Swim Award. There is absolutely no other swimmer more deserving than Valdez; in just one season he became the fastest freestyler on the entire swim team with his P.R.s being a 23.75 for the 50 free and a 53.41 for the 100 free. The last award of the night was none other than Varsity Boys MVP and was earned by John Larkin, junior. The entire swim season, no one came close to beating Larkin in the race for MVP. Racking up points every meet in his two main events, 200 Yard Individual Medley and the 100 Backstroke, Larkin held a constant lead above all his teammates that was ultimately unbeatable. Yanneli Pena, sophomore, said, “It was a great experience because I helped out the baseball team and had fun while doing it.”



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
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THE TREES ARE MISSING


SIXTH ANNUAL SENIOR INTERVIEWS
