The number of Perris High students taking AP exams have been increasing over the past couple of years. The 2017 AP exams took place the first and second week of May. 
What is Dual Enrollment? They are classes that allow you to take college courses in high school. These high school classes help you save money on tuition when you get to college. In order for you to take the classes, you have to sign up to be a college student at MSJC. You will concurrently become both a college student and a high school student. You earn both your regular high school credits as well as your college credits at the same time. The program offers classes to anyone who is interested. The classes you will take per semester would replace the classes you take at college.

Once you know that you want to be a part of Dual Enrollment, let your counselor know. They will enroll you in the classes you select.

The program does have some requirements you must meet. You must have at least a 3.0 GPA and you must take a test. The test will allow you to become a college student. If you want to take a specific class, you don't need a perfect score on the test. As soon as you take that test, you are now considered a college student no matter how high or how low you scored on the test. That should do it. The classes you selected will be assigned to you and the following school year-you will be a college student at Perris High School.

"I knew that surrounding districts were offering college classes for free through the Dual Enrollment program at the high schools by doing this, and I knew it would greatly benefit our students. Going to a four year university straight out of high school is great - but it's not for everyone and that's ok! Taking the Dual Enrollment classes is a wonderful stepping stone to learning about yourself and what you can handle, as well as learning some fun & exciting subjects!" enthused Noelle Ruiz, biology teacher.

#### How do you deal with multiple sport athletes?

"I encourage them to play another sport, I want them to be well rounded athletes, so when the college coaches come knocking . . . they'll know other sports as well. They won't be just basketball players, they'll be skilled individuals."

#### What is your role off season?

"To make sure my athletes get the proper rest off of basketball and me. When you're a family, your parents make you upset and you make your parents upset. You still love them but you sometimes need some time apart. Also to make sure they are hungry to get back out there, to play the game."

## How would you describe your coaching style?

"One way I would describe it is free. When they're out in the court playing I don't want them to look at me when they make a mistake, thinking I'm going to kick them out. Mistakes are bound to happen on the court, just like in life. I need them to know that if they make a mistake that it's not over. The game and life goes on. Always remember to have fun, but go hard. Whatever happens happens."

#### What made you switch from Girls Basketball to Boys?

"This decision was a very tough decision, just as tough as deciding to come over to the Girls. I was an assistant coach for the Boys for seven years, and now a former head coach for the Girls for 27 years. It's a switch that I feel is right in my heart. I want the girls to see a different philosophy on how to play the game. I wanna help out the Boys just as much as I helped the Girls. If I could get at least one player from the Boys to a Division I status this upcoming year, I know the momentum will keep building. So it all starts with one."

#### Do you see yourself as a role model?

"No, I'm not a role model, just a person who is trying to help a student get better. Their parents are role models. My role in all of this is to help them understand the game, and teach them to the best of my ability."

#### Describe the organization of a typical practice?

"Well in a regular season, very tough. A lot of running, listening, a lot of yelling words of encouragement, and definitely a lot of hard work. Throughout all the practices and the pre-games, education is talked about. Grades, how the students doing in their classes, if anyone needs any help with anything. Education is a strong point for me."

## How do you want to be remembered as a coach?

"The way I want to be remembered is someone who was fair and open-minded, but also someone who wanted to win every game. I want the girls to know that I support them 110% no matter what. As long as they play hard but have fun—I'm happy."




Students frustrated and tired had been on the
